Where To Find Us

St Mary's Church is at BN18 OLL

Coming from the east along the A27, 2 miles west of Arundel, take left turn marked Binsted. (Satnav and Google maps suggest a left turn nearer Arundel goes through to Binsted – it doesn't.) Coming from the west along A27, take right turn for B2132, Yapton Lane, signed Walberton Yapton Binsted, take first left signed Binsted, then turn right at T junction. Both routes: follow lane past Black Horse Pub to St Mary's Church, Binsted.

Forge Gallery is at BN18 OPQ

From the A27 take the B2132, Yapton Lane, follow it south to the roundabout, turn right into The Street, Walberton, and the Forge Gallery is immediately on the right.

PARKING

Binsted Lane There is **no parking** as farm vehicles require access.

St Mary's Church, Binsted Parking is at the Old Rectory, Binsted, just past St Mary's Church on the left – entrance in flint wall leads to parking on grass.


Forge Gallery There is a small amount of parking by the gallery; more parking in The Street, Walberton, or Walberton Village Hall car park.

Trains The nearest station is Barnham.

Taxis There is a taxi office next to the station, Barnham Taxis: 01243 551753.

Toilets At Stable Cottage, Binsted. It shares a drive with the Old Rectory – follow the drive round to the left.

Disabled access There is a ramp for wheelchairs at both St Mary's Church and Stable Cottage.

Mike will lead a small group in hand building a vessel inspired by the finds from the medieval Binsted kiln. Slab method will be used and a variety of decorating methods including oxides will be explored. Beginners welcome.

Mike has been potting for a number of years creating mostly thrown functional stoneware. He has developed his own glazes and continues to experiment. Recently he has begun working in porcelain. He has experience helping beginners throw pots on the wheel and can fire work for other potters.

Writers & Binsted's Past

Talks by Valerie Grove and Luke Jennings

Chaired by Dr John Godfrey, Landscape Historian



Part 1: Laurie Lee and Binsted

Valerie Grove's first biography of Laurie Lee was published in 1999, and in 2014 her new book, *The Life and Loves of Laurie Lee*, added much to the story of his emotional life – including his seven-year affair with Lorna Wishart of Binsted, from 1937 to 1943, which he wrote about in poems and diaries.

Valerie joined the London 'Evening Standard' in 1968, eventually becoming its literary editor. She also worked as a feature writer, interviewer and columnist for 'The Times'. She has published biographies of writers Dodie Smith (1996) and John Mortimer (2007). *So Much To Tell*, her biography of the children's editor Kaye Webb, was published in May 2010.



Part 2: Growing up in Binsted

Luke Jennings's family lived at Avisford School when he was a child, and his memoir, *Blood Knots*, includes many scenes set in Binsted during the 1960s, such as its vivid descriptions of his childhood attempts at fishing in Binsted's ponds. It was short-listed for the 2010 Samuel Johnson and William Hill prizes.

Luke trained at the Rambert School and worked for ten years as a dancer and choreographer before turning to writing. He is the author of three novels, *Breach Candy*, *Beauty Story*, and the Booker Prizenominated *Atlantic*.He is dance critic of 'The Observer'.

The Art and Literature of Binsted Woods

Walk in Binsted Woods: free event

Binsted's magnificent woods have an art and literature of their own. The curious drawings of W.S.Rogers from the 1930s and 40s show that he came back again and again to Binsted, particularly to Binsted Park, the 'mini-park' within Binsted Woods. Little is known about him, but the Record Office has 121 of his drawings. Other Binsted artists include Ralph Ellis (1885-1963), and artists of the Wishart family – Lorna Wishart, Michael Wishart, Francis Wishart, Yasmin David and Anne Dunn. Literary descriptions of Binsted's woods also come from the 1940s. Michael Wishart, in his memoir

High Diver (1978), describes near the end of the war how for him 'Binsted Park epitomised the vanishing England of my youth'. Laurie Lee wrote a long description in his diary of a day spent with Lorna Wishart in Binsted woods on 18 August 1940, with the German bombs dropping all day and a view of Ford Aerodrome on fire.

More recent memories include the angling and family memoir by Luke Jennings, *Blood Knots*, in which he nearly lands a very large fish at the Madonna Pond. We will visit some of these sites, with readings and a booklet of paintings.

Poetic Responses to the Sussex Landscape

Talk by Janet Pressley

Janet Pressley's talk traces the history of poetic responses to the Sussex landscape over five centuries – from Michael Drayton, an Elizabethan poet, to Lee Harwood, a Brighton based modernist poet who died last year.

The changing styles of rural poetry are explored. Everyone who attends is given an anthology of the poems and a selection of them is read out during the course of the talk, which is illustrated with pictures and photos.

Poets include William Hay, William Collins, Charlotte Turner Smith,

William Blake, Charles Crocker, Alfred Lord Tennyson, Wilfrid Blunt, Robert Bridges, Rudyard Kipling, Hilaire Belloc, Marian Allen, John Stanley Purvis, Virginia Woolf, Edmund Blunden, W.H.Auden, Andrew Young, Leslie Norris, Ted Walker and Grace Nichols.

Janet is a graduate of Sussex University and taught English at a local comprehensive school for many years. She now teaches literature, particularly poetry, and creative writing to adults.

In this relaxed and fun workshop, Matilda will demonstrate several of the different drawing techniques that she uses in her work; including watercolour, collage and drawing with ink. Drawing exercises will take inspiration from the beautiful surroundings of Binsted. You will learn how to construct a mini book.

Matilda Tristram studied animation at the Royal College of Art. She now works as a writer for children's TV (credits include *Abney and Teal*, *Dipdap* and *Sarah and Duck* for CBeebies), and teaches illustration and animation at Kingston University and Camberwell College of Art. Her graphic memoir, *Probably Nothing*, about having treatment for stage 3 bowel cancer whilst pregnant with her first baby, was published by Penguin Books in August 2014.

Matilda and her partner Tom Duxbury write children's stories together; their picture books *Santa's Beard* and *Santa's Reindeer* are published by Walker Books. She makes comics for fun, many of which can be found on her website, www.mmaattiillddaa. com.

'The Last Trip Home': A celebration of the working horse and ox in song and verse

'The Last Trip Home', with a combination of folk songs and tunes, poetry and prose, illustrates the vast changes in rural life (at Binsted as elsewhere) from the use of horse and ox to the internal combustion engine.

The show includes the Great War and stories of animals such as Hopit the horse, who was present at battles at Ypres in 1915, the Somme in 1916, Arras and Cambrai in 1917 and Roslers in 1918.

Cotillion takes its name from the first tune the group played to an audience when they started adding instrumentals to their repertoire of songs. A Cotillion is a French dance and tune, but there is also a tune called 'The Sussex Cotillion'.
